A panel of WG11 brainstorming group members will lead a dialogue on whether metrics and key performance indicators by which counsel or senior executives can measure success and overall efficacy of data security program implementations can be developed. The dialogue will focus on whether there are calculable, meaningful, objective measures that may be (1) assessed and used within the entity to measure overall success or failure and (2) compared across entities/industries to permit the creation of normative standards and facilitate objective cross-company comparisons. The dialogue will also focus on whether this is the type of work WG11 should engage in, and if so, in continuing the brainstorming effort, what additional types of stakeholders, if any, should be added to the brainstorming group.
